Fun Facts

QST has been published since December 1915, with only an eighteen-month period of non-publication due to World War I.

As of December 2011, 1134 issues of QST had been published totalling 178,391 pages, including covers and inserts.

In the very early years Hiram Percy Maxim and K.B. Warner distributed free QSTs to solicit membership in the newly-formed ARRL. The cost of ARRL membership and a subscription ranged from \$1.00 to \$39.00 in "then-year" dollars. This equates to current dollar costs of from \$21.59 to \$39.00 per year. The most expensive year relative to the purchasing power of the dollar was 1981, when membership cost the equivalent of \$59.87! (If the purchasing power trend line had been followed, membership would currently be \$50.00.)

The current period of 2001 to 2012 (11 years) is tied as the second longest period in the life of the League without a dues increase. Dues were \$2.50 from 1926 to 1946 (21 years) and \$4.00 from 1948 to 1958 (11 years). Ah, but what those few dollars would have bought back then!

+ *On the Air*: New 60 Meter Privileges Now in Effect As of March 5, US amateurs have new privileges on the 60 meter band. In addition to an increase in effective radiated power from 50 to 100 W, hams can now transmit CW and PSK31 on the following channel-center frequencies:

• Channel 1: 5332.0 kHz

• Channel 2: 5348.0 kHz

• Channel 3: 5358.5 kHz

• Channel 4: 5373.0 kHz

• Channel 5: 5405.0 kHz

Amateurs can also transmit USB voice and PACTOR III on the following suppressed carrier frequencies (the frequencies typically shown on transceiver displays):

• Channel 1: 5330.5 kHz

• Channel 2: 5346.5 kHz

• Channel 3: 5357.0 kHz

• Channel 4: 5371.5 kHz

• Channel 5: 5403.5 kHz


