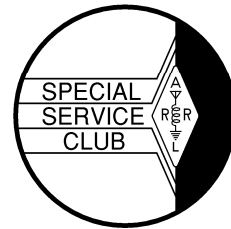

NVARC Forth Annual Lantern Battery Challenge

Oct 2012

The forth Annual Lantern Battery Challenge will start at the end of the October 18th meeting. So if you signed up be sure and pick up your batteries at the meeting. Rod WA1TAC has volunteered to distribute the batteries this year. (Thanks Rod!) Please make every effort to pick up you battery or have some one pick it up for you. If this doesn't work for you please make arrangements with Rod to pick up your battery after the meeting.

CAUTION. The battery packs this year have about an 18 inch long lead. You will have to make your own connection to this lead. Do this first. There is a tab that is inserted between the end of the last cell and the cell holder. Do not remove this tab before you have made your connection to the battery lead. After removing the tab from the battery verify with a VOM that the polarity of your battery connection is correct. You are responsible for making sure that the polarity is correct so you do not damage your radio. Measure Twice! At least.

Remember to keep the battery current down. Especially in transmit. The battery likes to give up it's energy in little sips, not big gulps. If you can hold the transmit current to an amp or less you will be rewarded with longer life. But extended receive periods will run the battery down just the same. Turn off the battery when you are not actively looking for QSOs. I've been told some radios draw current even when off. So I always disconnect the battery

when not in use. There will be a more detailed sheet of battery recommendation with the batteries when they are picked up.

If anybody has a question or wants to consider building up a small transmitter to get on in the Transmitter only mode send me an Email.

Good luck everyone and I hope to work you all in this years Lantern Battery Challenge.

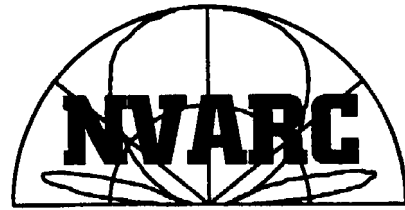

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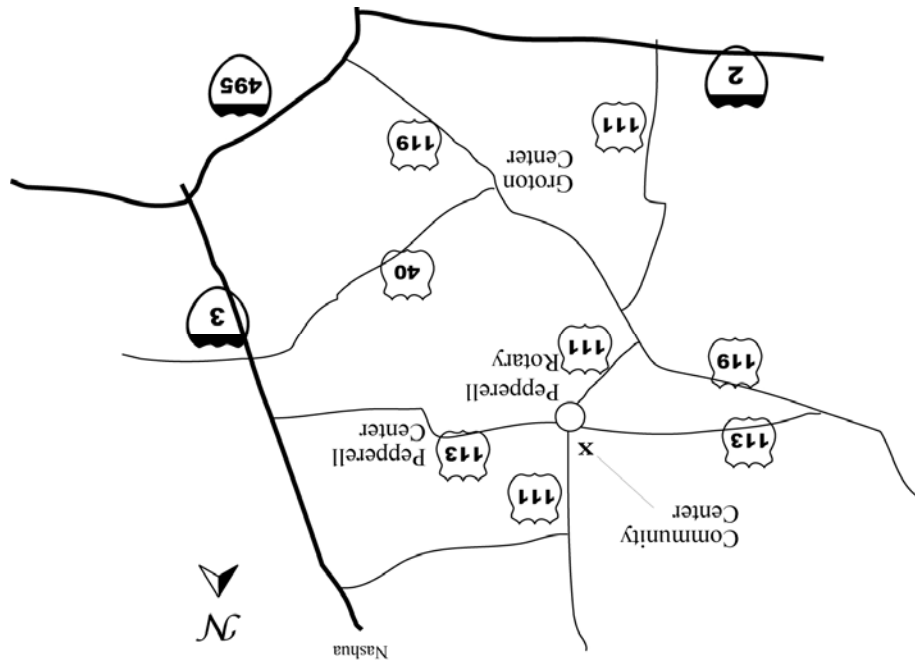
