

## Nashoba Valley Amateur Radio` Club

The Nashoba Valley Amateur Radio Club (NVARC) was formed in Groton, Massachusetts, in the spring of 1992 and has grown from the original 13 founders to over 50 members. While our membership is centered in the towns of Groton and Pepperell, Massachusetts, our membership includes residents from many communities in north central Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire. Dues are \$15 per year, which includes our monthly newsletter, *The Signal*, and a club yearbook.

The purpose of NVARC is to:

- ◆ Facilitate the exchange of information and general cooperation relating to Amateur Radio.
- ◆ Conduct club programs and activities to advance the interest and welfare of Amateur Radio in the general community.

NVARC welcomes all persons interested in Amateur Radio.

NVARC meets the third Thursday of each month September to June at the

Pepperell Community Center. Meetings start at 7:30 PM. The meetings are social, with a guest speaker or program.

During the year, NVARC participates in a number of social and public service activities. We provide communications for the Fall Soccer Classic in Pepperell (3 days), the Groton Road Race, the Pepperell 4th of July parade, as well as other activities as they arise. We participate in the Mass Highways "Adopt a Highway" program.

In June, NVARC participates in Field Day, a nationwide 24 hour emergency exercise sponsored by the American Radio Relay League.



NVARC members are involved in RACES, the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES), as well as various on the air activities, such as contesting, traffic nets (NTS), repeaters, packet radio, APRS, "DX-ing", "rag chewing", satellite communications, and a "Fox Hunting" group.

NVARC also conducts classes for those interested in getting an Amateur license, including the No Code Technician license. For more information about these classes or the club contact any one of the people listed below.

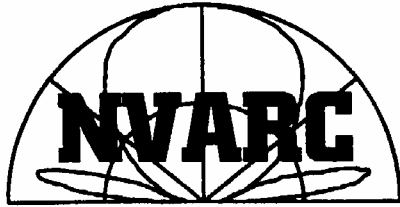

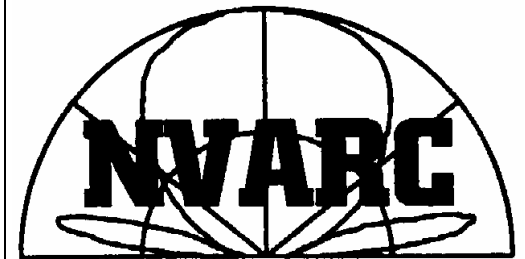
