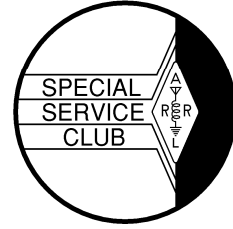

We especially welcomed the members of other clubs who joined us for the sort.



We sorted five boxes of cards. Eric, KV1J (the W1 sort manager), provided me a guesstimate that that's about 16,500 cards. As Stan always did in years past (thanks, Stan!), I did a quality review of the entire sort. This review gets all the cards right-side up and culls out any miss-sorted cards. Accuracy-wise we had 341 erroneous cards. Now, stacked up that's about four inches of cards and might not look too good to the uninitiated. But numerically that's only about a 2.1 percent error rate and it got fixed in the quality review.

Interestingly, the errors fell into three easily discernible groups. First, an "I" following the "one" is easily missed. Second, there is a forgivable bit of "fatigue-induced dyslexia." And finally, some of those pesky cards stick together—especially those thin ones from a certain S53! Plus, there was one Netherlander whose penmanship (relative to our "American sensibilities") didn't readily distinguish "Ds" from "Ps."

But what a lot of exotic places and interesting local images! Some of our international brethren put some wonderful QSLs together. True artworks. I like the Logbook of the World idea, but I hope it doesn't kill traditional QSLing. We'd lose a valuable part of the hobby—one that non-Amateurs can see, readily understand and appreciate.

Overall, a total of twenty-eight people participated in the sort. According to the sign-in roster we had seven guests from two other clubs, PART of Westford and MARA of Fitchburg.

From the President

Repeater Battery Fund

Larry KB1ESR reports he has collected \$300 toward the replacement of the repeater batteries. The batteries are two sets of three 105 AH deep cycle batteries. Larry has found the current cost for a set of three is \$510. The current two sets of three deep cycle batteries are five and six years old and were purchased by the North Middlesex Area Emergency Planning Committee (NMAEPC). Although the batteries have been maintained they are starting to show their age and should be replaced. The battery system has proven its worth several times in the past few years when the repeater site was without power for several days.

Since we are the primary users we have set a goal to collect half of the expected cost before asking for another donation. Hence \$510 for the first set. Larry has asked for time at the next NMAEPC to ask for a match or donation toward the second set of batteries.

Treasurers Report

Income for October was \$35 in membership renewals, \$10 from PowerPole connector sales, and \$50 from the raffle of the donated W1QSL Bureau

certificate, \$2.51 in bank interest, and \$0.15 from excess ILLW QSL postage.

Expenses were \$18 for newsletter postage, \$20.45 for check printing, and \$49.50 for soda and pizza for the October QSL sort meeting leaving a net income for October of \$9.71.

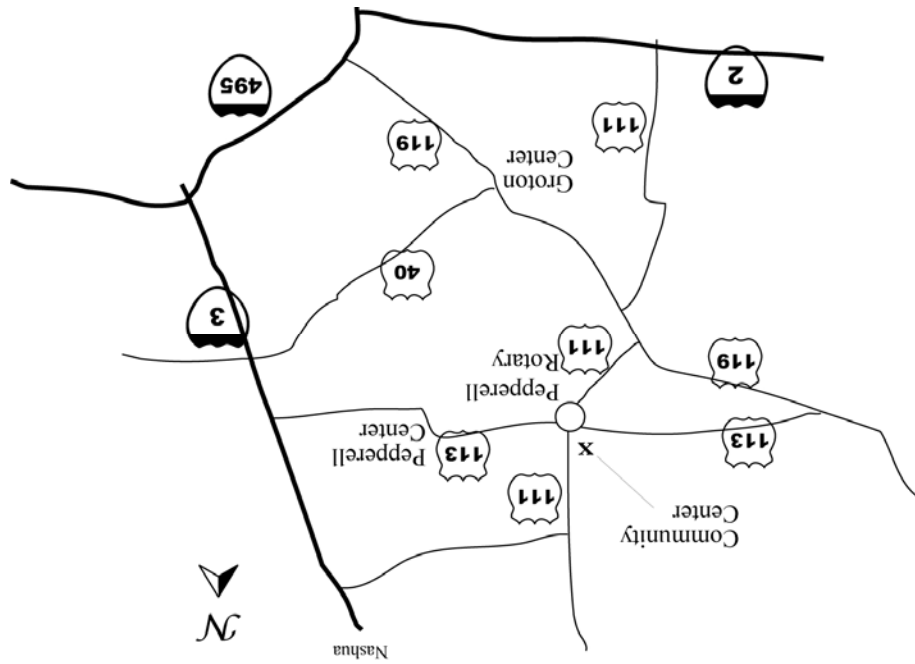
