I started column this last evening but didn't have any theme, so I cobbled together a few random thoughts. It didn't come out too well.

Then I headed out this morning for the club breakfast at Tiny's. Intentionally careful as I was when I stepped out the front door, I quickly found myself on my back. A trip to the Lowell General emergency room, a CT scan, three staples to the back of my head, and six hours later I was back home having breakfast. But I had a theme.

Gravity—it's the law. And it works mighty fast, too. What's that mean?

It means that antenna season is almost upon us and all good hams will be heading out to the great outdoors, up on the roof, up a tree, or up a tower. Be careful! And no matter how careful you are, remember that accidents still can happen. Given a normal

human reaction time of 0.3sec, a fall from the top of a 6 foot step ladder gives you barely enough time to think "SHIT!" before you hit the floor. (That approximates this morning's adventure, including the dialog.) From the roof of a single story house you have time to say "Oh Shit!" When you drop a wrench from a 25 foot tower you have time to say, "Heads up," giving your assistant time to look up and catch it in his teeth. From a 50 foot tower you have just enough time to say "Holy cow, it's a long way down."

And, as they say, "It isn't the fall that hurts. It's the sudden stop." At the end of a fall from a one-hundred foot tower you're traveling 54.5 miles per hour. So you can easily simulate the experience by jumping out of your car. Even if you're one of the slowest travelers on the highway.

So be safe. Belt, hard hat, plenty of tie-offs for parts and tools. And a spotter. Don't do solo work like I do.

And while we're on the subject, don't forget electricity. From accidentally touching an antenna to a power line to accidentally touching yourself to a power supply there's one important thing to remember: electricity works even faster than gravity.

Now, let me think... Those staples look like they'd make a perfectly fine 3-element yagi for the 47GHz band. Wonder how I'd feed it?


